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Liminal Letters

Beloveds,

When I took theater and drama courses in high school and college, I was taught how to have a stage voice—how to make sure I projected my voice to the back of the theater. When I started to see shows in which the actors were all



wearing microphones I was put off at first. Don't these actors know how to project? Eventually I came to understand that the microphones were necessary for the newer music, that they make shows more accessible to those with hearing difficulties, and that it was better for the actors, too.

Technology has been advancing at ever-increasing rates over the last two hundred years. And the computer age has pushed these advances and changes into overdrive. It can be really hard to keep up.

When I started attending a UU church in the late 1980's, the weekly newsletter went out in the mail. This technological advance was made possible by higher-speed copy machines—much better than the "dittos" we had when I was in elementary school. No carbon copies needed—a fresh copy for every household. Now nearly everything is via e-mail, which saves time, money, and paper. But it can feel like we're in information overload much of the time. There's so much out there, and most of it is readily available at our fingertips (or even at our voice commands). How do we keep from drowning in all of it?

Some folks have learned to take intentional technology breaks. Social media sabbaths, quiet times or zones where no phones or other electronics are allowed. Dinners where all the phones get piled on the table, and the first person who picks up their phone for any reason pays for dinner (would you be paying or getting treated)?

There are many benefits to new technologies. Electronic medical records mean that multiple providers can easily share information. I can search a library from home. DVRs allow us to record all the episodes of our favorite shows without having to be home at the exact time they're on—or even without having to put a fresh tape in the VCR. But we must be mindful that the technology serves us rather than the other way around.

So, what's your favorite bit of technology that wasn't around when you were younger? And what's something you might do well to take a short break from now and then? When we live into our faith, what is helping you to keep love at the center, and to live a life filled with generosity, justice, equity, pluralism, transformation, and interdependence? Dear Beloveds,

I don't know about you, but I'm finding the world a little hard to bear right now. So, I thank the universe for your children, who light up my Sundays and give me hope for the future. What are they up to?



The high school youth group continues to craft their service for June. They are

grappling with the differences between being with peers in their schools and being with peers at UUFSB. There is something special here, they say. This is a place where they feel free to be their entire selves without judgement.

Our middle school youth continue to explore other faiths. They just finished learning about Christianity with **Amy Hammock** and are moving through humanism, atheism, and agnosticism before entering the world of pagan faiths with **Pete DeSalvo** and **Doris Diamond**.

Meanwhile, the youngest are beginning to explore the values in the proposed revisions to Article II of our UUA bylaws. In March they learned about different types of transformation, and now they are thinking about interdependence. These are mature topics, but we invite the children to begin thinking about how to live our UU values when they are young. Don't ask them directly about the things they are learning...you'll usually get the non-response responses. But start a conversation about how we are all connected to each other and to all living things... Or start a conversation about how we can change what we see by looking through a kaleidoscope...

Two or three of our college-age students will be engaged in internships with the LIAC Student Activity Fund this summer. Here's a fun fact: our daughter Mina started doing environmental work (identifying plants!) at Sweetbriar Nature Center when she was 13. By her senior year in HS, she was an SAF intern there. She continued to work as an SAF intern at other gardens in Plattsburgh where she attended college. Now she works for Cornell Cooperative Extension near Plattsburgh. Her relationship with Sweetbriar, and the internship monies from SAF helped her to continue to learn and led her to the work she does now – and she is an employee, not an intern!! I know several young adults who came of age doing internships through SAF. Some had a straight path, often doing work related to the natural world, while others learned different skills. But they all had the opportunity to learn about paid work that was consistent with UU values and principles.

If you have a youth entering their senior year in HS or already in college, remind them of the SAF program. Details are <u>here</u>. As I reflect on the things that children and youth are doing, I realize that we are teaching them how to engage with the world in ways that are true to our

values. Small steps, but important ones, especially in a world that feels very fractured. I hope that you are proud of our kids. I know that I am.

Open Positions to be Voted on at Annual Congregational Meeting

Your Nominating Committee invites all voting members of our congregation to consider the following list of elected positions which will be open at the end of this worship year and voted on at our Annual Meeting on June 2, 2024:

- Board of Trustees: There will be 4 open positions, 3 for full 3-year terms and 1 to complete 2 years of a 3-year term.
- Youth member of the Board: There will be 1 open position for a 1-year term, but 2 youth could share this position. Must be 16-19 years old next year to be eligible.
- Committee On the Ministries of the Congregation (COMC): There will be 2 open positions for 3-year terms. You must have been a member for at least three years to be eligible.

- Annual Stewardship Campaign Chairs: There will be 2 open positions, 1 for a 2-year term and 1 to complete 1 year of a 2-year term.
- Auditing Committee: There will be 1 open position for a 2-year term.
- Endowment Committee: There will be 1 open position for a full 2-year term.
- Nominating Committee: There will be 1 open position for a full 3-year term.
