RE CORNER

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Greetings beloveds,

It is difficult to write to you this month. Our faith calls us to seek justice, to treat people with kindness and compassion, to exercise empathy, to fight for equity. All of these things are under attack now. The policies being implemented by the newly installed federal government are designed to sow fear, hate, and division.



I just saw an ICE poster on Facebook inviting us to inform on our families, friends, employees and co-workers, neighbors, and communities. Federal agencies are requiring employees to inform on each other if the employee is engaging in work to protect diversity, equity, and/or inclusion.

When the wall was pulled down between East and West Germany we learned about the extent of repression organized by the Stasi, one of the most brutal government entities in the history of the world. The Stasi operated through torture, intimidation, and a vast network of civilian informants to crush dissent to the policies and actions of the East Germany government. We are being asked to become another vast network of civilian informants. This is not who we are. This is not what our faith calls us to do.

Fortunately, there are many ways to respond. Begin by being a friend. Check in on loved ones who are feeling crushed and afraid. Offer them support – a meal, a drive somewhere, a safe place to lay their heads for a night or more. Tell stories about the gifts you have received from members of communities under attack – immigrants, Muslims, Arabs, Palestinians, and LGBTQIA+ folx, especially those in the transgender community. Write a letter, sign a petition. Resist cruelty and bullying. Speak out against violence, mass deportation, transphobia and homophobia, and genocide. We have the power of our whiteness, our middle and upper class standing, our education, our professions/work/careers behind us.

You may question my place in calling on you in this way. But I ask this for our children and grandchildren and the next seven generations. We must protect the world we have fought for and we must build a more loving and just future.

And I KNOW that you already and always do and have done this. You, my beloveds, already work for love and justice. We just need to keep on keeping on.

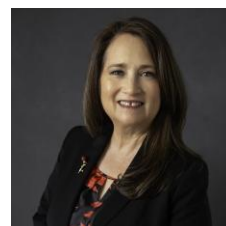
I am so blessed to have served in your RE ministry. Your Board will be speaking with you about searching for a new DRE. Please help if your wisdom and time are requested.

BULLETINS FROM THE BOARD

Board Update

1. At the Jan. 9, 2025 Board meeting, the Board convened with the Bylaws Committee to begin reviewing their recommended changes to the bylaws.
2. We appreciate everyone who participated in the Jan. 5th Town Hall, where we discussed a key issue regarding the minister's contract. The conflict arose between the recommended UUA standard contract language—giving the minister the right to hire, dismiss, and set compensation for staff in consultation with the Board—and the UUFSB bylaws, which state that only the Board has the authority to hire and dismiss staff. The consensus from the Town Hall was that the Board should retain approval over these decisions. Some attendees suggested a collaborative process or a consensus-based approach between the minister and Board. At the Board meeting, no action was taken on the language in the current draft contract, so it remains that decisions on hiring, dismissal, and compensation are “Subject to Board Approval.”
3. The Minister Search Committee continues to receive applications and conduct interviews for the ministerial position.
4. The Board has accepted, with regret, the resignation of Deborah Little as Director of Religious Education. We are already in the process of forming a search committee to fill this important role.



February Town Hall – Sun., Feb. 2, 12:15 p.m.

The focus of the upcoming Town Hall will be on safety and security. Given recent Executive Orders from the new administration, particularly the end of the policy that previously prevented immigration enforcement actions in churches, it is crucial that we discuss and plan how to best protect everyone who enters our building. CLIMATE CORNER

Six years ago, Nobel Prize winning physicist (and former Energy Secretary) Steven Chu gave a talk at the University of Chicago about the world's carbon-polluting industries. Chu pointed out the climate impact of animal agriculture, saying that if cattle and dairy cows were a country, they would contribute more greenhouse gas emissions than the entire European Union. "Just something to think about," he added, understatedly.

Fast-forward to 2025, and many of us are feeling called to do more than just think about it.

Here's one possible next step: next time you eat out, why not choose a plant-based option from the menu? **Happy Cow** can help with that. It's an app and a website that lists nearby businesses offering plant-based items. You can use the various filters to find whatever you're looking for: breakfast/lunch/dinner, type of cuisine, hours open, reviews, and more.

You'll find this handy locator tool at www.happycow.net, or download the app (Android version is free, iPhone version is \$4.99). The **map view** is a great feature!

User tip: If using your *phone* to visit the *website*, select the purple map marker icon, in the lower-right corner, to produce the map view. (*App users* will see map and list appear together.)

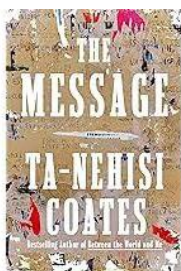

Annual Read-in of African American Authors – Sat., Feb. 8 at UUFBSB

A reminder & invitation to celebrate the history & culture of African Americans:



The Black Caucus of the National Council of Teachers of English established the Read-in in 1990 to make literacy a significant part of Black History Month.

Every year since 2009, the Racial Concerns Committee has hosted a Read-in of published works by African American Writers. We're doing it again in 2025.

We began doing this in '09 when **Janet Hanson** was Chair of RCC and just after **Paul Glatzer**, Chair before Janet, left to join the Huntington UU. 2025 will be our 16th year. This time there will be a difference.

Here at UUFBSB, we have enjoyed hearing inexperienced readers read aloud before an appreciative audience. Applause has a way of making young readers so comfortable that many ask to read again. We let them. Young readers are welcome to participate in the Read-in by reading aloud their own poetry or prose inspired by an event in African American history.

Young readers will meet in the Yellow Room from 10:30 to 12:00 noon.

Experienced readers in the past selected readings from fiction, prose or poetry. Once in a while, RCC agrees that a particular book is worth the attention of each adult participant, so we select

passages to read aloud from the same book. This year we will read from Ta-Nehisi Coates's *The Message*. While the book is short, it offers insights about Coates's career as a writer, teacher and journalist. As an African American descendant of enslaved people, he journeys to Senegal to understand what the journey 'home' means to him. In the longest section, Part IV of *The Message*, Coates describes traveling to Israel and Palestine where he attended a conference hosted by Palestinian writers and visited sites Israelis and Palestinians cherish.

If you enjoy hearing people read engaging, insightful prose, join us **Saturday, Feb. 8, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Blue Room at UUFSB**. This is a wonderful photo op for parents whose children read. The sign-up sheet is on the bulletin board at the Fellowship or call Barbara Coley 631-758-3436 to sign-up.

All are welcome. We'll have light refreshments. Come, for as Toni Morrison said, "We (humans) do language."

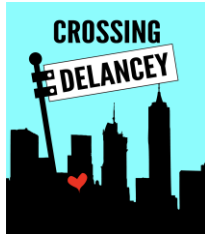
