Interweave Yarns

The Interweave committee is a group of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer People, along with their Straight Allies, who seek to promote the spiritual, social and justice goals of the LGBTQ community. Everyone is welcome to attend our meetings. Wow! What a busy June **Pride Month** we've had. We presented the annual **Welcoming Congregation service** on June 6th entitled "What's so important about (gay) marriage anyway?" So many people with positive comments came up to me afterward, some even said the service moved their thinking on the issue. So, I have to say, I think it was a big success. Thanks to all the people who participated, including Jeff Kochnower, Deborah Little, Denise Schnittman, Caitlin, Carol Wynne and Kelly O'Donnell. And a special thanks to David Kirk for singing and organizing the music.

The following Sunday, June 13^{th,} was the 20th annual **Pride Parade** in Huntington. A good number of people marched with our UUFSB banner; two or three times the number of marchers we've had in the past few years! We hope for an even better turnout next year! I remember attending the very first parade in 1990 as a spectator. Along with supporters, the parade route was also spotted with people carrying signs and shouting, "God will punish you," and other similar nonsense. It makes me realize how far we've come.

We also had a UUFSB Interweave table set up in the park during the festival, which worked out well. Some people interested in knowing more about our congregation stopped by for information and we were also visited by UUs from different congregations, both on and off Long Island. It also served as a "home base" for those of our marchers who stayed for the festival after the parade. We were able to let people know that we are here, and at the same time everyone seemed to be having fun.

On another front, we have been **partnering with the Empire State Pride Agenda** to collect names and contact info of people who support marriage equality. The plan is to get lots of names of people who are not active in the struggle but can be called upon the next time marriage equality needs a show of mass support... and a good amount of support is out there. I, myself, went to the Patchogue Memorial Day Parade to gather signatures. It's not a place you would think would be your most responsive venue for gay rights. Nevertheless, about 50% of the people we approached said they did support gay marriage and were willing to put their names down on paper as saying so. With that much support form John Q. Public, it's just a matter of time.

What's coming up for July? On Sunday, July 11th at Noon, we will be presenting the film "Trembling before G-d". This 2001 documentary by Sandi Simcha Dubowski runs 84 minutes and tells the stories of gay and lesbian Orthodox and Hasidic Jews, who are trying to reconcile their fundamentalist religion with their sexual orientation. On Saturday, July 31st, we will be having our first Potluck Picnic at the Fellowship beginning at Noon. All are welcome.

News Flash: The NY State Senate has just passed the Dignity for All Students Act, which seeks to prevent bullying and associated nasty behavior against students because of their race, religion, etc., and also because of their sexual orientation and gender identity and expression. This is the first time a bill has included transgender people as a protected class.
